



### **OUR PAST, OUR PRESENT AND OUR PLANS FOR THE NEXT 25 YEARS**

e are extremely pleased to share with you this twenty-five-year anniversary document that summarizes who has helped us since our incorporation in 1996 to now 2021. We will also share with you our plans for the next 25 years where our contributions to the economic growth of our metro area will be vital to maintain the Fortune 500 companies we have now and to attract many Global 100 organizations to establish their USA HOs offices in our metro area.



Data from the recent 2020 census shows the following:

• The US Hispanic population is expanding approximately six times faster than non-Hispanics and they account for nearly 80% of all the new business created during the last decade. Hispanics are continuing driving the economic growth of the entire country. In short, we are providing the "HUMAN ENERGY" that the country needs to sustain the nation's economic growth

a) Hispanics operate more than 4.5 million small businesses

b) Hispanic children are 25.75% of the population

• To a large extent economic growth comes with the growth of our general population and Hispanics are by far the only group growing in a sustainable way in the Nation, in Ohio and in Kentucky (See #'s for the last 10 years).

• States with larger growth in their Hispanic populations are strongly growing their economies and consequently offering better job opportunities to their residents. On the other side, states, or other metro areas where the Hispanic population is not relevant (low %) are growing at a lower rate, or not growing at all.

 Global Fortune 1,000 Companies are seeking vibrant growing communities to establish their USA HQs offices in metro areas that are growing their populations and have the workforce that supports all kinds of employment options in addition to making our Cincy-metro area a Global metro-city so we can strongly attract global Entrepreneurial organizations by "intentionally" welcoming them to our community.

• As you would understand, we are strongly competing with other metro areas (in the 2 – 3 million people range) to do exactly what we are trying to do, and our metro-area has not grown significantly in the last 30+ years! In our leadership team we believe that our Cincy-metro area has the best quality of life in the entire country and we can attract companies and people to relocate here!!

 In summary, our future overall goal is to influence our business community to proactively promote the growth of our population so we can become a global-metro-city and help all our residents economically ahead of our other competitor macro-regions. Our best years are ahead of us, and we respectfully request your trust and support to make this possible!!



R. O'Dell M. Owens holds both an MD and master's of public health from Yale University Medical School where he also completed a residency in obstetrics and gynecology. He completed a fellowship in reproductive endocrinology at Harvard Medical School and served as a clinical instructor in reproductive endocrinology. After returning to his native Cincinnati in 1982, Owens established an in vitro fertilization program at the University of Cincinnati Medical Center. He achieved Cincinnati's first successful conception and delivery as well as the first pregnancy from a frozen embryo.

Prior to coming to Interact for Health, Dr. Owens served as the Hamilton County Coroner, Cincinnati State Technical and Community College President and Medical Director/Interim Health Commissioner of the Cincinnati Health Department.

Dr. Owens has a long track record of service to community groups in Greater Cincinnati. He is currently on the board of the Cincinnati Fire Foundation, the Carl H. Lindner Jr. Family Center for Conservation and Research of Endangered Wildlife (CREW) at the Cincinnati Zoo and Botanical Gardens, the Ronald McDonald House, the Federal Reserve Bank of Cleveland's Cincinnati Business Advisory Council and is chair of the Cincinnati Preschool Promise.

For 29 years, he was on the U.S. Bancorp Board of Directors, and has served on the boards of the University of Cincinnati, Greater Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky International Airport, Cincinnati Red Cross, Fine Arts Fund (now ArtsWave) and the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center. For 10 years, Dr. Owens has volunteered as chair of the annual CET Action Auction which supports Cincinnati's public television programming. In 2020, the Cincinnati USA Regional Chamber recognized him as "Great Living Cincinnatian."




### **CINCINNATI: A CITY OF IMMIGRANTS**

Anti-Bullying Tool

As the members of our community heard about vicious bullying attacks on children of Hispanic appearance in the Cincinnati suburbs and numerous letters to school principals throughout the area, the chamber's board decided that the root of the bullying problem was ignorance - and they decided to make a difference. The Chamber organized historians and educators to produce a simple, visually enticing 24 page booklet entitled "Cincinnati – a City of Immigrants".

"We found that people were completely unaware of our immigration history" and that once they see that their own ancestors were often viewed with suspicion and struggled against discrimination and ignorance to get a start, they tend to be more tolerant of those peers they view as 'different'."

The booklet, has been distributed (free of charge) to schools, churches, hospitals, fairs, seminars and anywhere. The result as of 2021 has been the distribution of 210,000 (+) copies of this "antibullying education tool".





H-100 CINCINNATI

Hispanic volunteer initiative intended to help transform Greater Cincinnati into one of the most attractive and welcoming cities for Hispanics and other minorities.

We want to engage 100 Hispanic Volunteers to help in the Cincinnati metro area by participating in volunteer activities thus helping make our city a model of participation and contribution. This effort should help increase the diversity of ideas and contributions in our city's challenges while increasing the value of volunteerism and community contribution in Hispanic groups.



#### GOAL

To significantly increase Hispanic representation in community activities and in not-forprofit board of directors in the Cincinnati-metro area thus contributing and, in turn, the most attractive and welcoming city for Hispanics.



### **HISPANIC AFFINITY FORUM (HAF)**

These quarterly meetings are extremely popular within Hispanic Employee Resource Groups (ERG) in the Cincinnati metro area. These meetings are intended to share best practices to recruit, hire, develop and retain Hispanic employees in their organizations.







### **ANNUAL COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIPS PROGRAM**


Hispanics' future will depend largely on having our children graduate from college. These THREE successful local Hispanic professionals have generously provided personal funds (over the last 10 years) to provide additional support to our 18 years scholarship program. As a reference, 62% of the scholarship grants have been given to students that are the first in their families to attend college.

#### SUMMER CAMPS (For Hispanic youth/children)



Our Foundation works very close with community leaders to identify children who wish to attend summer camps but do not have the financial means to do so. Also, help families complete camps applications, secure requiered physical check-ups examps, and any incidentials related to camp attendance.

#### **DAY-TRIPS** (Daily field trips)



Young children in the Price Hill area, are given the opportunity to attend pre-scheduled daily field trips. (i.e. Museum Center, Coney Island, bowiling, etc.) We cover all incidentials, transportation, lunch, and all other expenses.

#### **ARTS** (Artistic participation)



Each year we participate in a multiple of artistics expressions for youth. i.e. MyCincinnati Youth Orchestra concerts, cultural exhibits like Day of the Death, Guatemala Alfombras, etc.

#### **DOMESTIC VIOLENCE PROGRAM** (Santa Maria Community Services)



Program for women who are in a home/relationship where they are experiencing some level of violence. Out of this program, we developed a **Violence Indicator**, a business card sized educational too that educates individuals on violent behaviors and their progression.

NUTRITION AND SAY NO TO DRUGS (Roberts Academy - Price Hill)



An after school program for students at Roberts Academy that supports socializations, character building, healthy life styles, and drug prevention. It provides positive adult role models and safe after school activities.

#### CHARACTER LOANS (Interest free loans)



Thanks to special grants received to support the growth of micro enterprises, we provide small interest free loans to Latino entrepreneurs who were not able to get regular commercial banking loans.

## 2006 CONTRIBUTIONS OF HISPANICS TO THE GREATER CINCINNATI ECONOMY

Prepared upon our request by the Applied Economics Research Institute of the University of Cincinnati, we share the outcome of this research project with the community at large.

#### **OVERALL SUMMARY**

Metro area contribute with 2.3 billion dollars per year to the economy. [This means that Hispanics representing 1.2 % of the residents, provide 2.6% of the economic value of the region]



#### HIGHLIGHTS

When comparing Hispanics with the rest of the Cincinnati-metro population the study found:

Contributions of Hispanics to the Greater Cincinnati Economy

- Hispanics have higher % of people with advanced degrees
- Hispanics have same % of people with bachelor degrees
- Hispanics have higher work participation

In 2020 and 2021 many small businesses got impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic, especially the restaurant industry. Meanwhile some of them had to close, others tried to maintain their services. We saw the struggle of many small Latino own restaurants and we decided to launch an initiative (**Cincy Sabroso**) to support them, and to inform the general public about the many restaurants around town.

**Cincy Sabroso**, A Part of the Latino Restaurant Week in Ohio initially started in Cleveland, OH and we adapted their concept in Cincinnati the first week of October during the Hispanic Heritage Month Celebration. We launched a website **www.CincySabroso.com** with the purpose of pay tribute to the colorful and delicious flavors of Latin American dishes from various local latin restaurants that has added their own diverse flavors to the city and we made available a directory of over 140 (+) Latino restaurants by country Cuisine.
